GENDER Sandra

Jay's comments in the previous issue about discussions she was part of at Windermere last May, are intriguing.

She questions what she sees as a kind of illusion in the attitudes of some trans people that gender does not really exist in some way. She begs to differ.

She wishes to direct attention to what she sees as commonsense observations about the effects of such experiences as 'parenting', 'adolescence', 'menstruation', etc.; and to what these experiences convey.

She closes with a remark that reminds us that great attention is given the world over, when a baby is born, to the child's 'sex'.

"When a baby is born, the answer to that question will affect that baby and those around it for the rest of their lives.", she says.

Jay wishes us, so it seems to me, to consider this a piece of plain-speaking, down-to-earth wisdom.

So indeed it may be. Certainly in the 20th century it was the kind of thing one heard quite often. Indeed it lay behind the ways in which trans people were regularly treated. 'Men', according to biology, who felt that in some way or other they were 'women' were given fairly short shrift by society at large and sometimes treated in ways psychiatrically that to us seem violent and abusive.

"Can't you see you're a man? Look between your legs!", to put it at its crudest.

"Don't you see that your crazy obsession about thinking you are a woman will destroy your marriage, family and friendships and horribly upset your parents, your church and your reputation, and leave you penniless without a job?"

But to claim, as Jay seems to do that this state of affairs is somehow based on FACTS which must be accepted in some way (a bit like divine fiats), seems to me to be problematic and questionable.

I feel I have to ask, seeing as we are in a Christian context, "does a society which considers it right to categorize a person's life expectations on the basis of biological or social conditionings truly deserve the name *Christian*"?

Let us consider a parallel case.

It occurred to Martin Luther-King after all, that the 'fact' that someone was black at birth, and that, 'quite justifiably' (in the opinion of the American church), that person's life expectations were different from an equivalent white child, was not only unacceptable but ANTI-CHRISTIAN.

He was not of the opinion that a human spirit born on earth should be judged according to the body it wore and allotted expectations accordingly. He believed that each person should be allowed and encouraged to unfold potentialities according to the spirit within; the essential individuality.

He tried to do this himself and to make it possible for others. To him this individuality was a 'fact.' This seemed to him the Christian thing to do. Like many other true christians he encountered violent and terrible prejudice for his pains, but was undaunted to the last.

Since when has a christian trend in evolution not had to face such oposition and painful experience and struggle?

Now very approximately, the gender issue is part of the same 'ball-park'.

As Jay points out many cultures still place great emphasis on the 'sex' of a baby. They regard it as an important fact, which obviously it is, just as if a baby is black or brown. It is important in the context of the development of the race or tribe, and by a kind of osmosis, it often happens that these considerations also impregnate and contaminate the legitimate views about the development of the unique individual as well.

So the real question is, "Should the 'fact' of gender be allowed to blot out or overwhelm considerations about the progress of the evolving individuality and destiny of the child? Should this destiny be subverted by racial, national and biological considerations as so often happens?" The 'fact' that it *does* often, or even *usually* happen does not mean that this fact should be left unchallenged or considered immutable.

It is true, older cultures especially the Roman and Jewish, had a deep hatred and fear of anything reminding them of a very much more ancient culture involving 'double-gendered

priest and priestesses' and the associated spiritual practices and traditions. (The only remains of such cultures long since vanished are exemplified in some of the Native American or Siberian regions possibly.)

Morbid fear of this kind of 'unorthodox gender-identity practice' is well-documented among the old Romans and certainly drives a great deal of American culture with its preoccupation with war and conquest even today. But this deep attachment to war, material prosperity and orthodoxy is not something that we especially associate with the Gospel is it?

I am not aware of passages in which Christ demands that his followers stick rigidly to the accepted norms or laws and codes of behaviour; or to regard the *status quo* in a society as cast in stone or even in biology. Rather one sees the effect of Christians *intervening* in all these 'facts' in order to change and humanise them through love.

Calling a spade a spade can be a useful quality if it is felt to be the *starting* point of the process of loving change rather than as a *finish* point beyond which all evolution is impossible.

The prison bars and burdensome chains of today's facts may turn out tomorrow to have been fleeting and less real than we thought, and easier to do without than we realised. After all, how did Peter, chained and imprisoned in lonely isolation actually walk lightly into freedom?

The vast majority of people have never questioned their gender and have lived their life on a solid, safe gender platform without realising it was even there. If only they knew how lucky they are.
